

BINGO! RULES OF PLAY

Welcome to you if you're a new Bingo go-er! We are pleased you're here! Here are some useful hints & tips to help you if you're not familiar with Bingo or how we play it at The Roses:

The Bingo starts at 1.45pm. All tickets must be bought by 1.35pm to give us enough time to count the total prize winnings.

We open the upstairs bar space at 1pm, so you have to allow enough time to buy your tickets from the bar, get a seat, a drink and to get yourself settled before the game starts.

B First buy your Bingo game sheets from the bar. We play 6 games of Bingo with a Flyer at the end. For each game we play the first person to get to a line, then the first to have a full house. For each Bingo Game it's £1. The Flyer is also £1. If you'd like to play all games and the Flyer, it's £7. All takings from the Bingo players go back out in prizes.

I The find a seat. Many Bingo-goers are regular players which is what makes this group so special, if there is a spare seat next to them, please feel free to sit there, everyone is welcoming and can help you out. If you need to sit somewhere so you can see the numbers as they are called, Jordan and Sam will be on hand to help you find a seat.

N Listen out for the start of Bingo! Whoever is calling the Bingo, normally Jordan or Liz, will let you know when the game is starting and will check that everyone is ready before they do. If you need more time, just pop your hand up or let them know you're not quite ready.

G If you can't hear or need more time just let the Bingo caller know. We expect everyone to be mindful and accepting that some people need more time than others. If everyone is patient and kind, we all have a better game.

O The Roses Theatre is a busy space and whilst our team know Bingo is on, sometimes there may be background noise in the building, it's the nature of our venue. We kindly ask you are understanding of this.

During the break we have a raffle. Please buy a ticket and support if you can.
